# Introduction

### What is Holocaust **Memorial Day?**

Holocaust Memorial Day takes place on 27 January every year. On this day, people across the country take part in activities to remember terrible events that took place in the past. In these events, people were hurt or even killed just because of who they were, their religion or the colour of their skin.

### What happened in the Second World War?

One of the biggest events that people think about on Holocaust Memorial Day is the Second World War, which took place about 80 years ago.

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In the Second World War, the Nazi Party was in control in Germany and was led by a man called Adolf Hitler. The Nazis believed that German people were better than Jewish people and did not like other groups such as gay people and Black people.

The Nazis tried to round up all the Jewish people and others they did not like. They put them in ghettos and concentration camps, treated them badly and even killed them. This is known as the Holocaust.

### After the Second World War

In 1945 the Nazis were defeated by Britain and its allies, which included the United States of America. This meant that the Holocaust was over and that Jewish people were free.

However, similar events have happed since in other countries around the world. On Holocaust Memorial Day we also think about these events and the people involved.
